
Let's make sub-Saharan Countries brighter for our Children and Grandchildren

Consequences for non-conformity to the Natural Law out of Underdevelopment

Although sub-Saharan countries have changed leadership a number of times since independence, although they have been producing an educated/skilled work force for over 50 years, although they have received numerous financial and technical aid, they have remained practically the same, namely poor and underdeveloped (Figure 1). Meaningful opportunities are for a handful few relative to the population and this has been the case since independence to date.

The scarcity of meaningful opportunities was not felt in the initial years after independence mainly because of the few people with formal education relative to their demand. Over time however, this scarcity became increasingly felt and it is now visible in almost all walks of life. It manifests as rising unemployment/underemployment among young people, as desperate search for greener pastures outside national borders, as increasing nepotism, as rising internal conflicts over resources such as land, and so on. This trend, arising from these countries' non-conformity to the natural law out of underdevelopment, points to a bleak future for our children and grandchildren unless we intervene as described in the 'Call to Action'.
